


A Regional Tony Award recipient, Chicago Shakespeare Theater produces a bold and innovative year-round season—plays, musicals, world premieres, family productions, and theatrical presentations from around the globe—alongside education programming for students, teachers, and lifelong learners, and engagement with communities across the region.

Founded in 1986, the Theater has evolved to present as many as twenty productions and 650 performances annually and has been honored with numerous awards. Chicago Shakespeare is the city's leading presenter of international work and has toured its own productions to five continents. The Theater is also dedicated to welcoming the next generation of theatergoers.

A national leader in the field, the Theater's arts-in-literacy programs support the work in classrooms across the region for tens of thousands of students each year by bringing complex texts to life onstage and through professional learning opportunities for teachers. Now in its twelfth year, Chicago Shakespeare in the Parks is a key component of CoLab, the Theater's year-round program rooted in engagement with neighborhoods and collaborations with local artists.

As a nonprofit organization, Chicago Shakespeare is, at its core, about people: connecting audiences and artists, partnering with teachers and students, and sharing with friends and neighbors. It is in this spirit that the Theater upholds its commitment to be an increasingly diverse, equitable, inclusive, and accessible organization. 20 years of professional development

Meaningful connections are being forged with our 20th cohort of Bard Core, a year-long seminar for Chicago Public School teachers. 

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Power, Politics, and Greed

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Edward Hall is the director of *Richard III* and Chicago Shakespeare Theater's Artistic Director. An acclaimed theater, television, and film director, he has staged productions in London's West End and toured his work around the globe.

Roger Warren's numerous publications include five editions for the Oxford Shakespeare series; he has also prepared many performing editions and has collaborated with Edward Hall on eleven Shakespeare productions over the last two decades.

Probably written in 1592 immediately after the *Henry VI* trilogy, *Richard III* is the culmination of Shakespeare's dramatization of the Wars of the Roses, which he had begun in the three parts of *Henry VI*. There is a strong sense of the past coming home to roost. One by one, characters reap what they have sown; and, while some of the characters curse Richard, he embodies in himself what they have been: he is the outcome of their own destructive violence.

To this extent, *Richard III* dramatizes the "Tudor myth," history as the Elizabethan chroniclers presented it, culminating in the Battle of Bosworth, where Richmond—the future King Henry VII and so the grandfather of Elizabeth I—ends a century of civil strife with the establishment of the Tudor dynasty. But, as always, Shakespeare complicates the pattern.

Richard is apparently a classic Elizabethan image of villainy as symbolized by his disability; they believed an unsound mind was also possessed by anyone with a disabled body. And yet, Richard is the center of dramatic vitality as Shakespeare uses and plays against this prejudicial view. In *Twelfth Night*, Viola observes: "In nature there's no blemish but the mind; none can be called deformed but the unkind." For Shakespeare, deformity lay in the eye of the beholder and was not inherent in the subject of description. So, he gifts us a sharp,





charming, and athletic villain to challenge our preconceived prejudices of how villainy should look and appear. From Richard's opening speech, his candor about his aims lures the audience into complicity with him: we become his

the first half of *Richard III* dramatizes Richard's rise; the second half, his fall and defeat at Bosworth. An important aspect of this defeat is that the character who deceives so many is himself outmaneuvered—

by Stanley's treachery but still more by Queen Elizabeth, the widow of King Edward IV. In a central scene, Richard woos Elizabeth to agree to his marriage with her daughter (sister of the princes in the Tower, whom he has just had murdered), in order to secure his political safety. This scene echoes his earlier wooing of Lady Anne, and Richard thinks that, as with Anne, he has won the encounter—contemptuously dismissing Elizabeth as he had earlier dismissed Anne: "Relenting fool and shallow, changing woman."

But he is wrong. Elizabeth is a tougher opponent than Anne had been: we subsequently learn that she has promised her daughter not to Richard, but to his enemy Richmond. The supreme irony of the play is that the great trickster is himself tricked. Is Richmond's glorious victory more equivocal than it seems?

Chicago Shakespeare Theater's John W. and Jeanne M. Rowe Inquiry and Exploration Series encompasses our varied audience enrichment programs relating to the artistry on our stages. With the participation of scholars, theater artists, and the Theater's staff, they provide thoughtful points of entry for engagement by our many audiences. Those who wish to dig deeper will be offered another lens through which to understand these great plays and the breathtaking art-making behind them.

Playgoer's Guide

THE STORY

Three generations have passed since the house of Lancaster usurped the throne of the Yorkist king, Richard II—and a long and bloody dynastic struggle between the powerful houses has raged ever since.

King Edward IV of York has reclaimed the throne, and England prospers in a rare moment of peace. The king's younger brother Richard, Duke of Gloucester—born with a disability and embittered by his treatment because of it—now embarks upon a violent plot to secure the crown. Lady Anne mourns the deaths of her father-in-law, King Henry VI, and her husband the Prince of Wales—both murdered by Richard. As she follows the funeral procession, Richard transfigures Lady Anne's curses into a betrothal of marriage. He plots his brother Clarence's execution and—placing the guilt upon King Edward—hastens the king's death. Disguising himself in the role of peacemaker, Richard pits courtier against courtier, confiding in them one moment and turning upon them the next.

Queen Margaret, the banished widow of Henry VI, returns to the Court, cursing her usurpers and prophesizing their doom. As Richard's detractors are executed, each comes to understand the ghastly truth of Margaret's prophecies. Declaring the king's two sons illegitimate and locking them away in the Tower of London, Richard claims the throne.

The crown sits uneasily upon Richard's head as rebellion against the new king's brutal reign of terror grows. And as the army of the Earl of Richmond, the last heir of the Lancastrian line, prepares to meet the king on the battlefield, the ghosts of Richard's victims rise to torment him.

DESIGNING *RICHARD III*MICHAEL PAVELKA, SCENIC & COSTUME DESIGNER

Designing a visual narrative for *Richard III* is an intriguing challenge. Like *Macbeth* or *Hamlet*, the story maps out the central character's journey into a disturbing underworld of psychosis and ultimately, self-destruction. The design can't afford to hold up the momentum of his slide into a hell. What the play offers is the full range of visual and physical possibilities for that journey. What's the context in which Richard can rise and fall with such ferocity and velocity? Who's responsible for creating his nemesis? How can we see the workings of Richard's mind in a similarly dramatic way to the confessions and quips he makes to the audience...and *should* we see them?

Richard III can at times be read as a tragi-comedy as much as a warped historical commentary. It's an entertaining sideshow of gothic horror but also a warning shot across England's bows. If handled deftly, design can reflect Shakespeare's themes by making physical icons that both appear and evaporate. The restlessness of the History Plays is a designer's gift to create fleeting, powerful visual triggers that

crystallize our collective memory.

This production celebrates the contributions of all the performers who knit together as a chorus to personify a subtext and support the central narrative: creating an identity and world for this group is my job. The ensemble adds significantly to any image either as passive voyeurs or protagonists-in-waiting; half in, half outside of the story. Here, we explore the internal motivations, expose them, and expand them into a physical



reality—splitting Richard's psyche into a squad of masked, white-coated but grubby Victorian hospital orderlies that look more comfortable in Bedlam than exposed on stage.

The logical expansion of this idea is a scenic world of mobile surgical screens and a pivotal operating table that contorts into a throne, tomb, or warhorse. A functional zip-up tower from a builder's merchants becomes "The Bloody Tower," equipped with a range of DIY weapons. The stage space is framed by contemporary trussing that supports the occasional use of a full-height, slashed, wipe-clean slaughterhouse curtain. The world of the design is therefore a collage. It's more of a psychological space than a geographical location—albeit overshadowed by the anchor-point of a ubiquitous flagpole and cross of St. George.

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THE MUSIC OF *RICHARD III*JON TRENCHARD, MUSIC DIRECTOR, ARRANGEMENTS & ORIGINAL MUSIC

The musical soundscape of *Richard III* draws on English choral music, especially madrigals and church music, to give this production the feeling of a Requiem Mass. The "Dies Irae", a thirteenth-century Latin poem about Judgment Day, used to be recited at Catholic funerals, and the ensemble sings arrangements



of the original tune to underscore executions and curses: "A day of wrath that day will be, when the age will dissolve into dust." We are also using the final words of the poem "Pie Jesu" to bookend the production: "Blessed Lord Jesus, grant them eternal rest."

As a creative team, have decided to focus on two musical themes: descending scales and semi-tone intervals. Chromaticism and the juxtaposition of semi-tone intervals (i.e. notes that are very close in pitch) are central to modern

harmony. As the audience charts Richard's descent into hell, descending scales were an obvious choice. "Down among the dead men" (an eighteenth-century British folk tune and the theme for the murderers) repeats the word "Down" as the pitch descends; "Locus Iste" (a nineteenth-century motet by Bruckner) underscores various scene changes in the first half and has an eerie bass line which descends chromatically; our production's modern arrangement of "Dies Irae" at Buckingham's death uses the same downward chromatic scale.

My brother and I were both choir boys, and we used to play out our sibling rivalry by one of us singing a note, and the other singing the semi-tone next to it—the resultant discord forced one of us to change note. Inspired by this, I use semi-tone discords to reflect the rivalry of Richard and Richmond for the crown.

For Richmond "the Welshman," we use a traditional Welsh hymn tune complete with nineteenth-century lyrics about "purging the realm" and "cleansing the nation"—disturbing words to us today. Older songs "Now is the Month of Maying" (a fifteenth-century madrigal by Thomas Morley) and the "Coventry Carol" (from a sixteenth-century mystery play depicting King Herod's massacre of innocent children) both oscillate between major and minor keys, hinging around a semi-tone difference in harmony, with the result that the listener feels either delightfully surprised—or deeply unsettled.

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
