YOSIMAR REYES (Writer/Performer) is a nationally-acclaimed poet and public speaker. Born in Guerrero, Mexico. and raised in Eastside San Jose, Reyes explores the themes of migration and sexuality in his work. The Advocate named Reyes one of "13 LGBT Latinos Changing the World" and Remezcla included Reyes on their list of "10 Up and Coming Latinx Poets You Need to Know." His first collection of poetry, For Colored Boys Who Speak Softly... was self-published after a collaboration with the legendary Carlos Santana. His work has also been published in various online journals and books, including Mariposas: An Anthology of Queer Modern Latino Poetry (Floricanto Press), Queer in Aztlán: Chicano Male Recollections of Consciousness and Coming Out (Cognella Press), and the forthcoming Joto: An Anthology of Queer Xicano & Chicano Poetry (Kórima Press). Reyes was featured in the documentary 2nd Verse: The Rebirth of Poetry. He is a LAMBDA Literary Fellow as well as the recipient of the Undocupoets Fellowship. Reyes previously served as Artist-in-Residence at the media and culture organization Define American. Reyes has toured and presented at university campuses across the United States.

KAT EVASCO (Co-Director) is an awardwinning writer, theater artist, comedian, and cultural strategist committed to honoring and celebrating the experiences of immigrants, women and LGBTQI communities. In 2020, Kat was awarded the Kenneth Rainin New & Experimental Works (NEW) Program Grant towards the premiere of her new play Be Like Water produced by Brava Theater in San Francisco, She is a 2018 LAMBDA Literary Fellow in Playwriting and her works have been featured on Deadline, IndieWire, Vice, Shondaland, Bustle, The Advocate, Out Magazine, and NBC News Asian America. Kat is the founder and CEO of With You Productions and holds a BA in Asian American Studies from San Francisco State University. Evasco served as the Senior Program Director and Director of Artist Leadership at the Center for Cultural Power, leading the design and implementation of the organization's core programs including the Disruptors Fellowship.

**SEAN SAN JOSÉ** (Co-Director) is the Program Director for Campo Santo, a new performances group by and for People of Color since 1996, who are the first Home Resident Company at the Magic Theatre in San Francisco, where Sean is the Lead Director. Honored to work with Yosimar and to collaborate with the Campo Santo crew at Brava.

JOAN OSATO (Projection Design/Producer) has played a pivotal role in local and national theater for over two decades and is a committed local and national community organizer. A core member of Youth Speaks since 2001, where she produces live performance events including Brave New Voices International Youth Poetry Festival annually in rotating cities around the country, she is also Producer for The Living Word Project and the critically acclaimed theater group Campo Santo. As a cultural organizer,

she works on behalf of national networks. and sits on the boards of the National Performance Network and the Consortium of Asian American Theaters and Artists. She is an awardee of prestigious grants from the MAP Fund, the Wattis Foundation, Kenneth Rainin Foundation, and the Creative Work Fund. She was the inaugural recipient of SFAC's Artist and Communities Partnership Grant, Theater Bay Area's Award for Excellence in Video Design (Tribes by Nina Raine, at Berkeley Rep), and the Surdna Foundation's Artists Engaged in Social Change Award. She has been recognized for her work as a photographer from Artslant, Prix de Photographie, and Laguna Arte Prize and has exhibited throughout the San Francisco Bay Area since 2009. In 2019 she received CalShakes Luminary Award for Community Engagement and was named a recipient of Yerba Buena Center for the Arts, YBCA 100.

MAXIMILIANO URRUZMENDI (Lighting Design) Born in Atlanta, Georgia to Uruguayan immigrants, Urruzmendi is an actor, teacher, technical director, and lighting designer in the Bay Area. They fell in love with theater at a young age as a way to find allies. They feel incredibly fortunate to conspire within artistic communities that prioritize engagement work centering listening, learning, reflecting and thinking creatively to offer transformative possibilities. Urruzmendi is currently the Technical Director of Production for Youth Speaks, and has had the privilege of working in varying artistic capacities with: Marc Bamuthi Joseph's Peh/LO/tah (TD); First Peoples Fund's We the Peoples Before (LD); Teada Production's Masters of the Currents (TD/LD); Joanna Haigood's Dying While Black & Brown (TD); Campo Santo/Ben Fisher's Candlestick (LD); Paul Flores' We Have Iré (LD); Be Steadwell's A Letter to my Ex (LD); Noelle Viñas' Abuelito (Father y Abuelito); Contra-Tiempo's Joy(Us) Just(Us) (TD/SM); Campo Santo/Star Finch's Side Effects (LD); Axis Dance Company (TD); and Kristina Wong's Sweatshop Overlord (Broadcasting/SM). Urruzmendi is overjoyed and honored to be a part of Prieto.

# CHRISTOPHER "SAUCY" SAUCEDA

(Sound Design/Producer) is a designer, composer, and many multi-hyphenated artist. He is a resident artist of Magic Theatre. Next up, Christopher will be designing an installation in Magic Theater and Brava Theater at the end of October.

TANYA ORELLANA (Scenic Consultant) designs performance spaces for theater, opera, and immersive experiences. Collaborations include Fefu and her Friends directed by Pam MacKinnon at ACT's Strand Theatre; The Industry's Sweet Land, an immersive opera directed by Yuval Sharon and Cannupa Hanska Luger at LA State Historic Park; Long Beach Opera's Voices from a Killing Jar by Kate Soper, directed by Zoe Aja Moore; The Winter's Tale directed by Eric Ting at Cal Shakes; and The Kind Ones by Miranda Rose Hall directed by Lisa Peterson at Magic Theatre. She is a core member of the award-winning ensemble Campo Santo, participating in their intimate

new work process by conceptualizing and designing sets alongside the writing process. She is a member of Wingspace Theatrical Design and an organizing member of La Gente: The Latine Theatre Production Network. She received her MFA in Scenic Design from CalArts and is a recipient of the Princess Grace Fabergé Theatre Award.

**GAYLE ROMASANTA** (*Dramaturg*) is a writer/ artist from Stockton, California. Her work has appeared on television, radio, online, and in journals and books, such as The New York Times, Time Magazine, Smithsonian Magazine. Harvard University's Education Next Journal, KQED's The Forum, ABS-CBN, and more. She co-authored the first book about labor leader Larry Itliong titled Journey for Justice: The Life of Larry Itliong with the late and great historian Dr. Dawn Mabalon. Formerly, she was the artistic director for Bindlestiff Studio, the only Filipino American theater space in the US. Currently, she is an artist-inresidence at Brava! For Women in the Arts, in San Francisco.

RYAN MARCHAND (Movement Coach)
Marchand loves working with artists on embodying their performance. Ryan served as Movement Director for Mommy Queerest's inaugural run and has coached movement in various capacities around San Francisco. He has performed recently with Shotgun Players, Crowded Fire, and New Conservatory Theater Center.

AGANA (Visual Set Art Graphic Designer) Known to the world as AGANA (American, b.1982), Vanessa Solari Espinoza is an internationally acclaimed multi-dimensional contemporary artist converging traditional large-scale murals and contemporary street art. Rooted in her Latinx identity of Venezuelan descent, hailing from the San Francisco Bay Area, Agana paints prolific imagery as calls to action encompassing black liberation, women's empowerment, environmental, and racial justice issues. Impactful and intentional to the specific locations they are placed in, Agana's artistry adds color and light to what would be blight. Agana's expertise reflects the Pan American experience, premiering at the intersection of graffiti and fine art praxis, communicating common social threads via monumental vision.

LOISSE LEDRES (Graphic Designer) is a Filipina freelance designer and illustrator based in the Southwest of what is colonially known as the United States. She is always experimenting to discover how image, text, and color intersect with culture to empower and mobilize people. Through her skillset in experiential design, she infuses interactivity within creative media and event spaces. She's worked with organizations and creative agencies in New York City, San Francisco, Los Angeles, and New Mexico. Ledres is also developing personal projects with like-minded creatives that facilitate creativity and break down obstacles to doing so. As Creative Director of Tagalikha, she helps lead discussions around the intersection of Filipino identity and creation. PERLA VANESA BARRAZA (Production Stage Manager) is a Fronteriza and Theater Artist coming from Tucson, Arizona. Perla migrated to the U.S. at three years old and lived here undocumented until 2018. Perla holds a B.A. in Theater Arts from Mills College and has performed in multiple Rolling World Premieres including Richard Montoya's Nogales, Milta Ortiz's MAS, Hilary Betis' Ghost of Lote Bravo, and Paul Flores' Stockton 21. Perla is grateful to Kat, Sean, Joan, and Toni, for giving her the space to grow in her new roles and to Yosi for allowing her to help tell their story. A final thank you to her partner and awesome support network who encouraged her to quit her 9-5 job to pursue theater full time.

THE LIVING WORD PROJECT In the past 20 years, the Living Word Project produced some of the most exciting performing and visual arts projects in the country. Amongst these are red, black and GREEN; a blues, /peh-LOtah/ by Marc Bamuthi Joseph, directed by Michael John Garces; Tree City Legends by Dennis Kim; The River by Richard Montoya; Chasing Mehserle by Chinaka Hodge; and Alleluia by Luis Alfaro, with Cal Shakes and Campo Santo, and TRIBES by Nina Raine (for Berkeley Repertory Theatre) - both directed by Jonathan Moscone. Current projects on tour include: Prieto by Yosimar Reyes; Try/Step/Trip and Spiritrials by Dahlak Brathwaite; Plantation Remix by Cristal Truscott and Progress Theater; EARTH SEEDS by Peoples Kitchen Collective: the boiling by Sunhui Chang; and Mommie Queerest by Kat Evasco. The World Premiere Commission and Production was funded by the Gerbode Foundation, Center for Cultural Innovation, and Living Word's many generous donors.

# CHICAGO LATINO THEATER ALLIANCE

The Chicago Latino Theater Alliance is a leading advocate organization for Latine theater in Chicago. Supporting the development of emerging and established Latine playwrights, actors, directors and theater professionals is central to our mission. This year, the Destinos line-up includes 17 productions all new to Chicago, including one North American premiere, three U.S. premieres, and five Midwest premieres.
